he people of Israel had a hard time with change. As soon as they were miraculously delivered from slavery in Egypt, they longed to be back there. Their grumbling prevented a whole generation from enjoying the blessings God had prepared for them in the promised land. Just think of what they missed! The people of Israel, through whom God planned to reach all the nations, not only failed in their task, but later opposed Jesus Christ and

God's new Covenant of salvation, led by their religious leaders, the ones who should have seen God's foretold plan unfolding. equip God's Church to show people the way to go. SF will continue to purchase, with your participation, Bibles, and resources to help overcome these crises of evangelism and discipleship. Our vision and goal have never changed, and fast-changing current world realities make our mission more urgent and needed than ever.

As God goes ahead of us, he is answering the prayers of faithful participants like you by sending new team members for the mission he has given us. In

this issue, you will read about new board member Dr. Amy Lynelle; Consultant

Eli Nupanga, and new staff Eileen
Martin and Ana Imes. Look how
God has uniquely prepared
them for our specialized niche
of ministry! God has been going
ahead of us for years, listening

What's in a [New] Name?



uite a lot! The Board asked Angela Brandle to lead the search for a new name and logo for BLF Ministries. She called on creative people inside and outside of BLF to find a name and logo that express what we are and how we work. So, what is in the new name and logo mark of Synergie Francophone?

The beautiful "open book" logo we were using belongs to BLF Éditions in France. As they have become independent – a ministry milestone achievement – it was time for us to us to find a new logo and name that reflect the collaborative nature and desired outcomes of our work.

Synergie (the French spelling), the coming together of partners to produce an outcome that is greater than the sum of each partner's effort, expresses well what we do. Partners like you share your earthly treasure to pay for the Bibles and books that we supply. We partner with the ministry projects of mission and church groups to ensure that books are provided in solid contexts of evangelism, teaching of disciples, and training of leaders. Recipients are taught how to use the resources we send so that fruitfulness will follow in their characters, lives, and work for the Lord.

Reflecting the three persons of the Trinity whose combined work brings salvation, growth, and

fruitfulness in the lives of believers, our logo mark comprises three colors and three elements.



The disk represents our planet, and the circle around it represents the French-speaking world that stretches around the globe. What do you see in the image? A quill for the writing of words – the method chosen by God to communicate with people on earth? A leaf that indicates growth as God's word takes root and changes a life? A flame signifying the transforming power of the Holy Spirit to bring fruitfulness in lives and communities as his words are lived out?



As that symbol breaks into the circle, so God is at work in the French-speaking world as greater distribution of his word overcomes the obstacles of ignorance and inaccessibility.

Our synergy is more than a three-stranded cord. There is God; you, and others like you; our suppliers – such as BLF Éditions; our partners in ministry on the ground; and our SF Board and staff, all working together to provide "literature," a powerful tool in God's hands to educate, teach, bless, and transform lives, communities, and nations.

A DREAM COME TRUE

"I can't imagine how in the world I never knew this organization existed!" exclaimed new member Amy Lynelle as she was welcomed to the SF board of directors in September 2021. "I could never have so perfectly imagined a ministry that I would be excited to join. I appreciate SF's unique focus on the French-speaking world."

Amy's interest in French is "one of those God things." In fifth grade, she transferred

mid-year to a school in her home state, Indiana, where she started learning French. It was a difficult introduction, since she was so far behind. Within a few years, "fabulous teachers" enabled her to excel in this language she had come to love. Amy was fascinated to discover Christian books in French while studying in France during high school and college. Years later, she served SIM as a translator. She discovered that the French-speaking world is "vastly underserved."

Dr. Lynelle's Ph.D. is in French language and literature, and her dissertation topic was Haitian poetry! She was "always interested in areas outside of France that had literary traditions." After its revolution in 1804,



Haiti had a century's worth of tradition before many other French colonies gained their independence. A poet herself, Amy fell in love with Haitian history and poetry. She has traveled to Haiti twice. She says, "It's a special, special place, a nation that has a thriving culture. I'd love for people to focus on that, rather than on its natural disasters."

Habakkuk 2:3 has been a key verse for Amy as many of her dreams have come later than she anticipated. When wondering why God led her

to spend so many years in academic environments that were hostile to Christianity, she realized that she has gained a deeper understanding of the effects of colonialism in French-speaking countries. "I have been waiting for something like SF. God hasn't forgotten me. He wouldn't give us passions and dreams if he wasn't going to use them."

Amy's seven-year-old daughter is interested in Egypt, so the two of them are studying Arabic! Amy hopes to visit missionary friends in North Africa when that becomes possible. She'll be able to speak both French and Arabic there and will take some biblical books in French in her luggage!

NEW MERCIES EVERY MORNING

God continues to provide just the right people for BLF's new season of ministry to the French-speaking world! Consultant Eli Nupanga has arrived in God's time, with outstanding skills and resources for the creation and refinement of our logo, online and printed communications pieces, and more. Eli explained that

"everything SF is dealing with I've already done in starting my company, or for clients."

Born in Bangui, Central Africa, Eli also lived in the Democratic Republic of Congo and Pretoria, South Africa, before coming to the Chicago area in 2007 to attend high school. Our Ambassadors Russ and

Mary Ann Miller taught Eli's parents at FATEB (Bangui Evangelical School of Theology). Eli's wife, Lynn, works for Tyndale Foundation and met SF's Leadership Team when we applied for a grant last spring. SF's focus on the French-speaking world and involvement in several projects in the DRC also drew Eli to us. His first real job was running a children's library, including raising funds to purchase textbooks. "I really understand what you do," he said. "I lived through it. I have lots of

work with locals."

Eli continues to serve FATEB Seminary along with other mission organizations. In fact, the website he

developed for them as a teenager is now the email platform for their entire program. While staying

in the US with only infrequent visits home to Congo was hard, Eli "saw the analogy to being 'stuck in the mud.' I needed to be on a firm surface to help others. Being here enables me to do way beyond what I wanted to do."

God continues to bring gifted members to the SF staff, such as Eileen Martin, Bilingual Executive Assistant to our Executive Director.

Eileen grew up in Tacoma, Washington. She fell in love with French because she "thought it sounded beautiful, like music." Studying other languages was a window into someone else's world for her.

Since Eileen's parents and grandparents came from four different countries (Ireland, England, Canada, and South Africa), she was always interested in "all things international," especially geography. This love of travel came in handy when she worked as a technical translator for a French fingerprint identification company. She would be "borrowed" by affiliates, which involved travel to a variety of countries. During college, she participated in a student work exchange program, traveling on her own to Paris, finding housing, and working for a summer in a shop near Notre Dame Cathedral.

Several years ago, Eileen began volunteering with Angela's SIM International French Media Group. "I was amazed that I could use my French in a non-corporate setting," Eileen said. This connection to Angela drew her to SF.

In Eileen's role at SF, she hopes to help Angela as her assistant and further the goals of the organization by contributing what God has given her. She is excited to participate. She didn't realize "how inaccessible many materials are for people in places like the ones visited by Pastor Jonas in the DRC."

In addition to her SF job, Eileen assembles products and fills orders for a business owned by friends. She feels blessed to work with Christians in both positions.

Eileen reflects often on Philippians 4:8 and tries to bring a faithful focus to all she does. "My husband Paul and I were primary caregivers for a parent in our home before we had children," she said. "I'm hoping that the practice helped prepare us to be parents. Maybe our daughters will let us know some day."

GOD HAS ANSWERED

We have all been praying for talented young contributors to help develop our communications and online presence, and God has sent a lovely gift in response. Eliana Imes is our new content and style editor. Her name, in Hebrew, means "God has answered."

As a George Fox University senior, Ana brings strong communications experience and a fresh perspective to her part-time position with SF.

She's a great example of the way God draws people to this ministry who are passionate about spreading the Gospel to the French-speaking world, even those who do not speak French.

Ana's parents served with SIM throughout her childhood. When Willy and Angela Brandle moved to Oregon City, just a mile from the Imes' home, they were quickly adopted as grandparents. "Angela let me come to the college Bible study they led when I was in high school," Ana explained. "I remember her talking about the 10/40 window and how many of those least-reached regions were French-speaking. That was my



introduction to the needs of the French-speaking world."

Ana's touch can be seen on our new website for which she edits and writes text. The flexible schedule fits well with her college workload, which includes heavy responsibilities as the co-editor-in-chief of the school newspaper, majoring in philosophy in hope of someday teaching, plus preparing for a possible master's degree. "I'm passionate about translating the very technical aspects of philosophy into something

accessible," she said. She loves to write creative nonfiction (for which she has won awards) because "storytelling is the best way to learn about each other and about God."

Ana's family moved several times while she was growing up, which may help explain her choice of Bible verse to share with us. She finds Ecclesiastes 1:1 "strangely grounding," especially because her mother, a professor of Old Testament, believes that "mist, all is mist" would be a more accurate translation than our more common use of "all is vanity." Ana appreciates the counsel: "don't hold on too tightly," which shows wisdom beyond her years.

UBECA FINALLY RECEIVES A LIBRARY

ecurely shipping books from France to remote locations in Africa can be complicated! Flexibility, time, and God's intervention are necessary to take books from warehouse to shelves. Our last newsletter showed two boxes of books provided by our readers for a Christian university in Dungu, DRC, waiting to leave Entebbe Airport in Uganda. A local pastor took care of the boxes until safe passage was found. Because no one at Dungu had ordered merchandise, the trucker lined up to pick up the boxes had no reason to go to Entebbe.

In his providence, God showed this need to a Christian woman in Entebbe who sends materials safely across the border into Congo. She picked up the boxes from the local pastor and put them on the bus which would be met across the border by a vehicle from the University. The books safely crossed the border, but the driver from the university fell sick and could not make the trip. Once again, God led someone at the bus station to put the books on a bus going to Dungu. A member of the university staff drove into town and picked them up.

Imagine the excitement of students and professors when the car arrived on campus, and the books were unloaded and placed on the shelves that had been waiting



for the library to begin! Dr. Bagudekia Alobeyo said, "Even the titles of the books we've received are impressive. The students have a great desire to read every book because they see that each one will contribute enormously to their formation and growth of their faith." One of the teachers was reading the book *Follow Me* by David Platt. He came across "a call to die." He was astonished to realize how he can be called to die. He understood that it was a call to a commitment he had to make to be willing to sacrifice his life for Christ, because through Christ he has eternal life.

As bees around pollen, students lingered by the shelves, selecting books they wanted to read. Even during break times when they were free to leave, they could be seen sitting outside devouring their new spiritual food. The steps taken to safeguard and deliver the books safely are clearly worth the effort.

In the early years she served as an assistant teacher, and later started teaching the class on her own. If you asked Nadège, she would tell you that the biggest challenge in her role is finding materials. Sunday School is often held under a tree. Distractions are frequent. She appreciates having a lesson guide that allows her to spend her preparation time reading over the lesson and then looking for ways

PASTOR JONAS' JOURNEY - THE FINAL LEG

In March, 29 churches and over seventy Sunday School teachers in Kinshasa, joined Pastor Jonas and his team for a series of training. The team provided Bibles and teachers' manuals and taught the pastors and Sunday School teachers how to use them.

This work continued through April, when the team made stops in Boma. There, forty churches were represented, and over two hundred Sunday School teachers were trained! The teachers celebrated that "[we] don't have to look for material for lessons, because [we] have the curriculum." In May and July, they continued through the Batéké Plateau and to villages in Mukedi, where 47 churches were represented overall. The team led training in biblical teaching and leadership skills, supported by books for the leaders from SF.

During the next stretch of their trip in August, the team focused on providing resources and encouragement to churches and leaders in rural cities like Mukedi, Idiofa, and Tshikapa, in the Kwilu province. The turnout was dramatic: 37 churches participated in the training, and 20 teachers

of religion were trained. Pastor Jonas described the locals as "enjoying the message of the materials, being amazed," and "glad to have well-done materials to use." Teachers who had been working with only a Bible and remarkable perseverance are now supported by Sunday School materials to help with teaching children and are described as "fired up to do the ministry of making disciples of children and youth in their churches."

The impact of these new resources cannot be overstated. Many Sunday School leaders who had no resources expressed relief at now possessing tools designed specifically for their situation. And what important work it is! The pressure facing many teens and young people to "join in violence, such as attacking homes with machetes" is great. "Thankfully," said one teacher, "because of the training, the youth will know Jesus as their Lord and Savior and become light in their villages." Some of these students have accepted Christ and are sure to become an influence for him in their communities.
