

Majority-World Leaders Are the Voice of the Future

hen I think about our theme of empowering African voices and missions, what immediately comes to mind is the changing face of world missions. There are an estimated 425,000 missionaries today according to the World Christian Encyclopedia. Of those, about 170,000 come from the West. The remainder come from the Majority World of which Africa has a significant voice. Today 77% of all Christians live in the Global South or in the Majority World. Majority World leaders are

leadership for world missions. These leaders are the voice of the future.

Although the African voice is being heard, the French-speaking African voice is much less prevalent.

Part of the general trend is that the

slowly assuming the mantle of global

French voice no longer has a significant influence in global missions. In Africa, over 900 unreached people groups exist, more than 600 of which are found in French-speaking Africa. If these unreached peoples are going to hear the Gospel, they will likely be reached most effectively by French-speaking African leaders.

In working with our partners in French-speaking Africa, God is giving us the opportunity to help make their voices heard in a global environment. It is a privilege to work with these quality leaders. As you may have already read in their stories, these individuals are uniquely qualified and highly trained to take the Gospel to their countries and beyond.

So why are these African voices so important for the spread of the Gospel? For centuries now the Bible and the mission mandate have been viewed primarily from a western culture and perspective. This view has had a great global impact. Yet as we look at how missionaries are distributed, only 3% work among or focus on unreached or least-reached people groups. New perspectives on Scripture and on the task of world

missions are desperately needed. The emerging voices from francophone Africa are an invaluable, critical part of gaining that global perspective. These are ideal leaders to shape a new vision for the missionary task lying before us.

If there is anything that I have learned in my 40 years of missions, it is that God has always taught me more from those whom I have served than I have

given. I believe this is and will be true of

our relationships with leaders across francophone Africa. SF has much to

learn from these young men and women. We are so excited about our Beautiful Feet program and the opportunity to give francophone leaders in Africa an opportunity to share their voices and speak into our own work.

In this issue, it is our joy to present to you two exceptional leaders in our

Beautiful Feet program: Adeline Tchiakoua, a theologian teaching at the Evangelical Theological Seminary in Cameroon and Ghislain Yamongbe, a chaplain, writer, and publisher who is training to be a medical missionary in the Majority World.

You will also learn how God is working through surgeons training at the Pan-African Academy for Christian Surgeons (PAACS). These community leaders are learning not only to be excellent surgeons, but also to share the hope of Jesus with those who suffer.

We also would like to honor Walter Zurfluh and Rory Clark, two leaders who passed away this year and left a legacy of faithfulness to the Gospel in missions.

I pray that together God will use the richness of his multicultural body to accelerate even faster the spread of the Gospel and the growth of the Kingdom of Heaven.

God Chose Her to Be a Woman who Counts

Based on a testimony recounted to Angela Brandle by Adeline Tchiakoua

nfortunately for Adeline Tchiakoua, she was the youngest of three Cameroonian siblings, all girls. Her parents had wanted at least one boy. <mark>"</mark>I don't have any chil<mark>dren," h</mark>er father would say. The extended family put pressure on her father to remarry. They had, after all, arranged his marriage to

Adeline's mother, who had suffered domestic violence at his hands, causing severe handicap and ill-health later in life, along with her shame over his dalliances with mistresses whom he had gone so far as to invite to sleep in the familial home. As a child, Adeline would sleep on the sofa to defend her mother against her father's violent outbursts.

"I cried most days from the age of two," said Adeline. "I was shy, fearful, and insecure." And she carried a burden of guilt for not having been born a boy. She started asking questions about the meaning of life and what happens after death. She sought after God, asking Him to reveal Himself.

The family's religious practices did not answer her questions. Along with involvement in the Catholic church, her father consulted marabouts (Muslim

religious leaders) and practiced occultism in their home.

Despite her tumultuous circumstances, including being expelled from home with her mother and sisters, Adeline did well in school and was usually top of her class. Her father was an intelligent man who worked for a bank, but after he attempted to strangle his wife, a judge condemned him to prison. The loss of his livelihood shattered Adeline's dream of going to university.

Feeling ashamed but undeterred, some years later Adeline applied to a university in a different town. She

owned just one skirt and had four dollars to her name when she began her freshman year. Having learned English, she translated university courses to earn money, cooking only twice a week and eating porridge the other days.

A woman visited the university campus and shared

the Gospel with Adeline who accepted Jesus as her Savior. "I may not have had a childhood or adolescence," said Adeline, "but I have eternal life." From that point, Adeline clung to Jesus, and trusted Him for her daily needs.

Reading the Bible, Adeline realized that it was not a problem to be a woman. God loves, values, and works through women! When reading in Isaiah 44:8 that "you are my witnesses," she knew that God wanted her to be a missionary. She joined Campus pour Christ (Cru). Her church supported her to go to Bamako, the capital city of French-speaking Mali. Later, she taught new missionary recruits. Adeline is now the National Prayer Coordinator of Campus pour Christ Cameroon. Working in collaboration with churches, she organizes prayer seminars and

recruits intercessors, mobilizing concerted prayer for Cru's main objectives of evangelism and discipleship.

Adeline completed a Master's in company law in 2003 and started teaching at FACTEC (Cameroon Faculty of Evangelical Theology) in 2011, a school that graduates about sixty workers annually for God's mission of transforming the world through Jesus Christ. Her spiritual gifts quickly became apparent. The dean of the school recognized her as an able spiritual teacher, and missionary mentor and SF partner Alain Stamp invited her to be a speaker at an Evangelists' Forum. >4

3> For many years, Adeline used her meager income to support her badly handicapped mother. After an unhappy and difficult life, her mother was depressive and needed Adeline's psychological support as well. Through this care, Adeline's mother came to the Lord before she died in 2019. Her father died the

Adeline is currently completing a Master's in Christian leadership and plans to pursue a doctorate. She is the only woman teaching at FACTEC. The school promotes intimacy with Christ, excellence, integrity, transparency, and responsibility as desired values for faculty, students, and graduates, qualities that drew Alain and Martine Stamp to Adeline.

deprived past. A certain vulnerability remains, however, as for all who have been starved of a parent's love, abused, and demeaned.

Significant ministry is preceded by significant boot camp, and boot camp is hard! God redeems and uses the pain of our past to make our ministry to hurting souls more effective, more credible, full of hope that they, too, can rise above their circumstances "to console the mourners in Zion – to give them a crown of beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, and a garment of praise for a spirit of despair. So they will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the LORD, that He may be glorified" (Isaiah 61:3). Such is Adeline.

SF is proud to partner with this gifted but humble teacher by helping to provide books for Adeline to complete her master's and doctoral degrees. This will help her to influence and prepare, even more deeply and capably, new leaders and workers for God's mission to Africa and beyond while continuing as a missionary herself in addition to her teaching and studies. She is a powerful yet gentle example for so many women in her context whose value is yet to be recognized.

African Surgeons Embodying the Aroma of Christ

n the face of surgery, questions fester: "Is God punishing me? Why is this happening? Does God even exist?" In times of such vulnerability and pain, hearts hunger for messages of hope. Surgeons equipped with the Word of God have a critical opportunity to share the Gospel with those who, in their suffering, might be open to Jesus for the very first time.

The Pan-African Academy of Christian Surgeons (PAACS) prepares surgeons for such crucial moments. This five-year post-graduate surgical and spiritual training program offers residencies in 11 countries and 17 mission hospitals throughout Africa. As their website states, PAACS "disciples African surgeons to glorify God and provide excellent care to those in need."

In an interview, I spoke with Dr. Ed Scearce, the

Spiritual Dean of PAACS. He partners with 150 residents who are trained to be not only the world's finest surgeons but also Christian leaders in their spheres of influence. Residents learn inductive Bible study techniques, doctrine, how to grow as disciples, and how to impact the world–particularly through evangelism. Revered in many African cultures, doctors have a powerful platform for influencing their communities. Spiritually equipped PAACS surgeons are leveraging these platforms to share the Gospel with some of the world's most vulnerable people.

In many places throughout the African continent, there is only one surgeon to serve a population of 250,000 or even 2.5 million people. But PAACS graduates are rising up to be salt and light. Dr. Limbe >6



5> has been an integral part of developing the surgical department in his home country of Malawi. Dr. Jacques serves on the PAACS board (20% of which is African), has opened a clinic in the DRC, and dreams of growing it into a full-fledged hospital. Dr. Youcoubu, one of the first PAACS graduates, is the director of Niger's Galmi Hospital. Even current residents are leading before their graduation: preaching and serving right where they are.

To help empower these leaders, SF provided 60 sets of three biblical books, the Africa Study Bible, and SD cards of 130 books, which Dr. Scearce distributed to residents gathered at a conference. Residents expressed their deep gratitude for these valuable resources, which explore subjects such as theodicy, pressing ethical questions facing many Africans, and world religions from a Christian perspective.

In an email, Dr. Tefinirina Aina Mirana Razafimanantsoa, a PAACS resident, told me, "The books are particularly

useful to me to better understand the world and to better know how to effectively approach certain delicate subjects in order to introduce the Gospel." Dr. Alain Nishimwe, another resident, added, "I think that these books are very important and useful for us, the future leaders of Africa."

In a world plagued with error, biblically orthodox materials are essential. Dr. Nishimwe appreciates how the books offer a biblical approach to the poverty, famine, corruption, polygamy, and sorcery facing many African communities. Dr. Razafimanantsoa said, "I work right in the middle of a place where animism still reigns. Most sick people that arrive at our hospital practice this religion in one way or another."

Biblically grounded, residents are taught to pass along the truths they learn and teach them to others. In this way, these African leaders are shaping not only their communities, but the future of Africa with the aroma of Jesus. Dr. Scearce prays that residents and faculty will embody this divine aroma wherever they are. Career aside, all believers are called to this high vocation. "The goal...is the same for you and me: to be the aroma of Christ right where God has planted us within our sphere of influence."

Workers of the Eleventh Hour

hislain Yamongbe, also known as
Pastor Gee, is many things. He's a writer, a chaplain, a missionary, and a nurse-in-training. He's a husband, a father of two, a volunteer at Youth for Christ, and the founder of a publishing house in Benin. I recently had the privilege of speaking with him about

his life, his faith, and how he got his start in mission work.

When I asked Pastor Gee how he first entered the mission field, he said that his faith journey is inseparable from his life as a missionary. "All my life as a Christian, I've been a missionary. In 2003, I took my university scholarship and went on a five-day trip across four countries to take part in a student missionary congress in West Africa. It was the beginning of everything for me. I also saw myself as a missionary when I started youth ministry and couple and family ministry in 2010 in my country. These were almost neglected and unaddressed fields of the Kingdom of God. We did

pioneering work in this area."

Ministry work is not without its challenges.
About his work in the US,
Pastor Gee says, "God took me out of my comfort zone to the ends of the earth. By coming to the US, I'm aware that I'm on a launching pad to reach nations."

6> work in the US and Africa, Pastor Gee said that the "worship and church cultures are radically different," but that "the Gospel to be proclaimed is the same." His work in Africa made for excellent preparation for ministry in the US, giving him a background in personal organization to manage busy days, and, in his words, "a shepherd's heart for everyone, especially young people."

After an evangelists' forum in 2014, Pastor Gee met Alain Stamp and later joined SF's Beautiful Feet program. "For me," he continues, "the mission of Beautiful Feet... is to manifest God's love in practical ways and share the Gospel, aiming to transform lives and positively influence French-speaking communities through the power of the love and grace of Jesus Christ."

The work of the Gospel is a work in progress, with mentors passing their knowledge and experience from one generation of leaders to another. Pastor

Gee credits Alain and his writings with much of how he interprets the Gospel. "I understood the heart of Jesus when He talked about a disciple. We encourage each other, share experiences, and support each other."

Just as Pastor Gee was mentored by Alain, so too does he want to continue in the same tradition.

Along with fellow Beautiful Feet partner Reverend

Mahouna Maxime Kakpo, he introduced the mentoring concept to his denomination. In a testimony written for SF, Pastor Gee says that there is "a pressing need to mentor young leaders. Some people describe me as, 'the one who is there when you need someone to listen to you.' I have been involved in an environment where the gifts of the Spirit are valued more than the fruit of the Spirit. And when this is the case, the damage is considerable... For this reason, the mentoring relationship with my protégés is focused much more on identity and position in Christ, and then on accountability."

In our interview, it

became clear that Pastor Gee is intensely focused on the future of the Gospel ministry in the US, Africa, and Haiti. In addition to creating a social media ministry to reach out to youth, he is mentoring fifteen young servants of God. He says this of the work ahead: "The harvest is great, and the Master continues to call workers. I have faith that we, the workers of the eleventh hour, will do the work before nightfall."

Two SF Coworkers Meet Their Creator

his past spring our board and staff were saddened by the departure of two coworkers:
Walter Zurfluh and Rory Clark. Walter, 96, and his wife Nancy (deceased 11 years ago)

were missionaries in Germany with Eastern European Mission (EEM) for 36 years. Soon after Russ and I began working with BLF in Belgium in 1995, the Zurfluhs were driving through Belgium with a team from America and stopped at the BLF bookstore to give their team a tour of our publishing house. The Zurfluhs had retired from EEM and lived in California.

BLF was looking for ambassadors in the western US, and the Zurfluhs were happy to step into that role. They spoke at churches, conferences, and college campuses, and were instrumental in recruiting teams. Nancy explained a lot about representing BLF that was very helpful to us when we became ambassadors. After Nancy's death, Walter moved into Pasadena Highlands where he lived until the Lord moved him to his Heavenly Home.

That left Russ and me as the only ambassadors for BLF in America. We couldn't travel the entire country, but we did make it to California twice. We visited

Walter, talked, and prayed together. He told us credit: Clark family about Rory Clark who had worked with USCWM (now Frontier Ventures), based in Pasadena, for several years, then settled in Lake St. Louis, Missouri. He felt that Rory and his French-speaking contacts could be very helpful in expanding the ministry of BLF. When we returned to the Midwest, we contacted Rory, and he invited us to a Bible study meeting at his home that evening.

We told Rory about BLF and, with our board president's blessing, invited him to ride up to Wheaton, Illinois, with us and attend the board meeting. The board "fell in love" with Rory and asked him to join the USA

Board. He accepted the invitation and from that point on worked with BLF/SF.

Through his language skills, cultural understanding, and caring spirit, Rory

strengthened SF's leadership

connection to colleagues in France and French-speaking Africa. One time Rory and his wife Marjorie hosted a BLF board meeting in their home. He included participation in a Perspectives class session, wonderful times of worship, and intercessory prayer for many people groups. He consistently provided new and

varied resources for prayer, and he eagerly introduced friends from his global network of ministry partners.

Rory's "big project" soon after he began working with BLF was to translate the Perspectives course into French. Rory was worried about translating Let the Nations Rejoice, a thick book that all were to read while they took the course. We told him that BLF had translated that book into French, and it was in the process of being printed. Really?!

What a relief! Rory asked Fred Mondin, a BLF editor, to work with him on translating the

course. Fred accepted the offer. It was a huge project!

When Rory found that he had bile duct cancer, this translation project was nearly finished. Fortunately, he and Fred were able to complete it. Last fall while we were making visits in southern Illinois, we decided to visit Rory and Marjorie. Rory was having a bad day, but he had just received the first printed copy of Perspectives in French and was thrilled to show it to us. We are praising the Lord that He allowed the course to be completed while Rory was still alive! Many French speakers have been waiting eagerly to study it. Well done, good and faithful servants!

The vision of missionaries Phil and Robin Malcolm was to see a healthy, child-friendly church within walking distance of every child in West Africa. With Assemblies of God World Missions (AGWM) since 1998, they began working with local churches in Côte d'Ivoire and later, Togo, Ghana, Burkina Faso, Benin, Senegal, and Sierra Leone. They quickly discovered three

needs everywhere they went in West Africa: teacher training, space for children's ministries, and biblically-sound curriculum contextualized for African churches. Focused on these three needs, the Malcolms based their work on the principle that trained and resourced African churches can far better disciple their children than an outsider. >11

Elise Tegegne (pronounced Teh-GAYNE) did such a good job as our content editor, that we have promoted her to Director of Communications (part-time). 9> In 2005, the Malcolms' predecessors gave them their collected resources, including a copy of the BLF Sunday school curriculum *Jesus and Me*. They were astounded! Here was a full eight-year program of agegraded Sunday school materials in French, written for Africa, and ready to use!

The Malcolms recommended this valuable resource to any church who asked. They sought BLF's agreement to translate the materials into English for anglophone countries. The translation, completed in 2019, is not quite ready to print due to COVID shutdowns.

Sadly, Phil passed away in 2022. Robin continues as

a missionary to the children of Africa as Curriculum and Resources Coordinator for Africa's Children, a ministry of AGWM-Africa. She is partnering with SF to edit the English translation of the materials and make them available to churches in anglophone Africa.

The SF/AGWM-Africa's Children partnership is a significant advance for the under-resourced African church. Not only will it provide biblically sound, easy-to-use, culturally contextualized materials, but teachers who use it learn organically how to more effectively reach and disciple the children in their communities.

LIFE-ON-LIFE IMPACT, BOOK-ON-LIFE IMPACT

10> Mary Ann's life impacted Adama Djouf and Lynn Lockwood. Adama Djouf impacted Adama Sène. Books sent by Lynn impacted Adama who impacted his son Élisée. There is no stopping God using his Word and his people to keep impacting and transforming lives.

Charles is one of the team's favorite translators. He said how much he appreciates the books they bring on subjects including *Mediums*, *Astrologers*, *Healers...*What They Don't Tell You by pastor and teacher Emmanuel Mannlein. "This is perfect for me!" said Charles, "I have a ministry with another pastor, and we pray for people who are troubled by spirits." Charles saw a copy of the Africa Study Bible and said he would like to read it. The team had one ready for him with his name already in it!

MTVCP has partnered with Mission Inter Senegal of Thiès to establish a health clinic in a Wolof village near Kaffrine, an area whose residents have been very resistant to the Gospel. In answer to prayer, God brought two Christian men to serve as head and assistant nurse. They are interested in family issues, about which Lynn has been sending them books. Isolated as a single Christian, assistant nurse Abdou is encouraged to have a source of answers for the people who ask him questions about his faith. "I was pleased to see that the books I've been sending him

are being read and shared. I'm imagining his impact on the community with an entire study Bible!" wrote Lynn. "Nurse Jean-Paul's wife sings and helps lead worship. We talked about how the two of them will be able to study this Bible together."

When Lynn arrived in the village, she was welcomed by Samba, a teenager whom MTVCP has encouraged in his journey through school. He had one of Abdou's books by John Piper in hand, to read while waiting for the team's arrival from their accommodations in the city. Even better, Abdou is clearly sharing his resources and mentoring Samba, whose late father was a seeker of the Truth.
