Ministry Story

For years, Pastor Modeste served with SF partners Bud and Charlotte Kroeker distributing Bibles in the remote fringes of the DRC. Today, Pastor Modeste and occasionally Madame Lucie make multiple annual trips to the Pygmies evangelizing, training volunteers in community development, and providing pastors and believers with training, biblical literature, and Bibles. Traveling by dugout canoe, plane, motorcycle, and foot, they brave hazardous roads, illnesses, and other dangers. When unable to join a trip, Madame Lucie makes and sells slippers to support their ministry.

In addition, the Mbombos teach the Word of God in their local church: Pastor Modeste as a pastor since 1992 and Lucie as leader of the women's ministry. Pastor Modeste is also the Provincial Director of Evangelism, Mission, and Church Planting for 32 parishes in Kinshasa, where he has planted churches.

A Call from Christ

Passionate about the Great Commission, Pastor Modeste and Madame Lucie have a heart to evangelize and equip unreached indigenous Pygmies in the DRC.

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:19-20a)

Why the Pygmies?

Forbidden by law from having the same rights as taller Congolese, the Pygmies are marginalized, vulnerable, and destitute. They are considered slaves, forced to live and worship in isolated communities without proper medical care, food, education, and often clothing. Suffering from spiritual as well as physical poverty, the Pygmies engage in traditional religious practices that include ancestral rites and fetishes. But thanks to the good news of the Gospel preached through faithful witnesses like the Mbombos, many Pygmies are coming to Christ, experiencing spiritual and material transformation.
